Spanish Speaking Club - Wednesday lunchtimes
We have had a committed band of year 11 students coming every week during year 11 and some of them came during year 10 too. Students bring their lunch, and we practise talking about different topics from within the GCSE curriculum to help students become more confident and fluent in describing their opinions about topics such as where they live, their family, holidays, hobbies, school, technology and future plans for university and jobs. This has made such a difference to those students who have attended, and they have all scored highly on their mock speaking exams, whether they are doing the Foundation tier or the Higher tier.
This club is open to all students currently studying GCSE Spanish and it is a great way to improve your confidence in speaking.

## Science Department

We've had a busy time in science this term with Science Club, Crest Award Club, a Year 9 trip and, of course, National Science Week activities.

Science Club has been really popular, Mr Marris and Mr Thompson consistently have a large group of Year 7's coming. A highlight this term was investigating the types of bacteria living on different surfaces around the lab by swabbing with cotton buds and growing cultures on agar plates. Students have also designed and tested parachutes, created an exothermic reaction to make handwarmers, and are now working on designing and building LEGO bridges.


During the first week back after Christmas a group of eager scientists in Year 9 visited the Faculty of Science and Engineering at the University of Liverpool where they were able to carry out experiments in state-of-the-art laboratories with the support of PHD students. It was a great way for them to see how the experiments we do at school are built on to solve real-life problems.

More recently during National Science Week, there were lots of STEM activities going on. A surprising number of students were (worryingly) keen to dissect eyeballs and hearts one lunchtime, whilst others were busy building catapults that were used to fling mini marshmallows around the lab.


The chemistry department did us proud with their amazing explosions and the year 7 \& 8 science quiz final was quite competitive this year.

## Humanities Department

## History

Year 7 students have been working hard on their new topic of 'who was the most successful medieval monarch globally', and looking at the richest ruler that ever lived, Mansa Musa. They have also compared rulers like Genghis Khan with King John and Eleanor of Aquitaine, working out what makes a successful leader.

Year 8 have been enjoying their work on the suffragettes and the suffragists and looking at the difference between them once they finished their work on World War One.

Year 9 have been exploring the social revolution in the 1960s and we have loved sharing our musical knowledge and sounds through the musical counterculture of this time period, including the work of Bob Dylan and how he used his music and lyrics to show society's wrong doings and the need for change.

Year 10 are starting their paper 3 topic of Weimar and Nazi Germany having completed paper 2 Elizabeth I.

Pupils were doing research for their final art exam and this will enable pupils to study works of art first hand which will inform their contextual studies in both coursework and externally set assignments in the Spring term.

Here are some reflections from a few Pensby Islamic scholars:

## Abdelrahman

Ramadan is the $9^{\text {th }}$ month of the lunar year. Fasting is one of the five pillars of Islam. There is also a verse in the Qur'an that prescribes fasting of all Muslims who are mature and healthy enough to do so for the whole day.
Fasting is when you don't eat or drink from dawn to sunset. Fasting is also seen as a way to learn patience and break bad habits. It's an act of worship, a chance to get closer to God, and a way to become more compassionate to those in need.

## Eleanor

## Why is Ramadan important to Muslims?

Fasting is important during Ramadan as Muslims believe it allows them to devote themselves to their faith and come closer to Allah.

## Who started it?

Mohammed started it because he wanted others to feel how poor people feel. He wanted it to be a test for people. Some people find it a hard challenge. It is meant to be a time of spiritual discipline - of deep contemplation with God. Extra prayer, increased charity and generosity, and intense study of the Qur'an.

## The reward for fasting is immense!

It is a time where Muslims seek forgiveness, in the hope of rewards of heaven from the mercy of Allah. Seeking forgiveness from Allah to pardon a believer's sins is among the rewarding acts of worship Muslims are urged to observe day and night.

## India

Ramadan is the holiest month for Muslims, they do a special tradition called fasting which means they don't eat in the day, only before sunrise and sunset. They do this to experiment how poor people feel. They get to read they Qur'an daily by reading it they learn more about their religion. Each year Ramadan starts on a different day. Around 1.6 billion people in the world are Muslims!

## Maths Intervention

This term students have been working hard in the SSC where they receive tailored intervention on the Complete Maths Tutor platform. Students receive support with any topic from numeracy skills to trigonometry, depending on their needs. These students are on their way to becoming fantastic mathematicians. Well done!


## New Phonics Programme started September 2023

This programme provides intensive, targeted support to address specific gaps in a student's reading. This is delivered three sessions per week. It teaches each student at their challenge point to accelerate progress. Throughout the programme the student is taught sets of speed sounds with simple mnemonics to help them read and write the letter-sound correspondence quickly. Students to be assessed every half term so they are always learning at their challenge point.

The 27 students on this programme are gaining in confidence with some students reading/spelling ages increasing by as much as 12 months during the first 3 months of this intervention.

Every year CILIP (Chartered Institute of Library and Information Professionals) invites students to take part by becoming 'shadowers,' as they 'shadow' the judging process for the Carnegie Medals; they read, discuss, and review the books on each shortlist, engage in reading related activity which they can share online, and vote for their favourites to win the Shadowers' Choice Awards. Pensby Pundits and other students like to take part in this challenge and enjoy the right to vote for their favourite. Here is this year's shortlist and one of the live author talks we've seen:


## Manga

The interest in Manga in all year groups continues to grow and so we have added two more box sets to keep students reading! Manga originates from Japan and is a form of storytelling using art and words. It has many genres ranging from adventure and romance to horror, science fiction and even Shakespeare! Manga is appealing and captivating and can be used to engage reluctant readers because of the combination of text and pictures. The reader must follow a storyline and plot, engage with, and understand characters and their point of views. Manga can also help bridge the gap between graphic novels and traditional texts.

World Book Day was created by UNESCO on 23rd April 1995 as a worldwide celebration of books, and here at Pensby we have the same aim as them - to promote and encourage reading for pleasure. Year 7 had a great virtual visit with Kate Wiseman on World Book Day. Kate explained about her fun 'Gangsta School' books and about her new book series coming out in July, that involves mudlarking. Students answered and asked lots of great questions, and Kate set them two challenges - to go away and write a book review for their favourite book or invent a new character that could feature in one of her books. We sent Kate our entries and she chose the winners and very generously sent lots of books, stickers, and badges as prizes!


British Science Week: Working with the science department we ran a competition and a display of all our STEM books (science, technology, engineering, and mathematics) in the library. Year 7 also watched a virtual author event run by the BookTrust featuring British Scientist Dr Maggie Aderin-Pocock. This was also tied in with our celebration of International Women's Day as Dr Aderin-Pocock, who is best known for presenting BBC1s The Sky At Night, has been made into a 'Barbie Role Model' in recognition of her achievements in making space and science more accessible to girls!

## Chess Club:

## History Fiction and Film Club:

The History club have continued to attend every Wednesday. They have spent the majority of this term enjoying a selection of Horrible Histories episodes and sharing their knowledge on the events covered in the show.

The students will also be involved in judging the 'Good or bad egg' historical figure just before the Easter break.

## The Brilliant Club

This term our "Scholars Programme" students attended their Graduation Ceremony at the University of Liverpool. Last term six Year 7, and seven Year 8 students completed a programme on Disease Detectives, where they researched the spread and impact of infectious diseases.
Students worked with a PHD researcher on the university style module based on the researcher's world-leading expertise. The programme was pitched at a Key Stage above where students are currently studying. It has developed students written and verbal communication, critical thinking, and metacognition skills, through following this supra-curricular content. They were graded on their work in a university style assessment, both Callum Macrae and Sam Davies achieved a 1st Class result.
This programme is designed to support students to develop skills and knowledge to help them make ambitious and successful applications to universities, should that be what they decide they want to do. At the same time, students have developed great academic skills to support their schoolwork day to day.


## Smart School Council



In September we launched the Smart School Council. This is a different way of doing school council than in the past with more emphasis on student leadership and student voice. Each form chose a representative at the start of the year, and we meet on a more regular basis than in the past with the student council members being keen to give their time to bring their ideas and those of their forms for discussion.

The main group of students are called the Communication Team and members of the team have been proactive this year in planning and running a week of assemblies to introduce themselves to the rest of the school; they have also been asked to support Mr Flanagan and his team by asking questions during an interview process for a new member of staff as well as having a meeting with the Ofsted inspector to answer questions about their views on the school.
Our older and more experienced students have been proactive in helping the younger ones learn the ropes and all the adults who have met our student council have been very impressed by their maturity, understanding of the topics under discussion and their enthusiasm for making our school the best it can be.

One of the benefits of this way of running the student council is that all students in school can be part of an Action Team. These are made up of students who have a particular focus and ask a member of staff to support them in running their group. Currently we have the Eco Action Team, the Charities Action Team, and the SEND Action Team. We hope to have a Pride Action Team very soon which will aim to support diversity in school.

We plan to keep developing the role of the student council to give students opportunities to grow their leadership and communication skills.
